Peace Corps Director Carol Spahn





Carol Spahn brings more than 25 years of public and private sector experience, and has worked in countries around the world on issues ranging from small business development to infectious disease prevention and women's empowerment.

Most recently, Carol served as the Peace Corps chief of operations in the Africa region covering Eastern and Southern Africa. Previously, she served a five-year term as the country director of Peace Corps/Malawi.

Carol's Peace Corps roots extend back to her service as a Volunteer from 1994 to 1996 in Romania, where she served as a small business advisor.

Before returning to the Peace Corps as country director, Carol was senior vice president of operations at Women for Women International, an organization serving marginalized and socially excluded women in conflict affected countries. Prior to that, Carol served as

executive director of Accordia Global Health Foundation, a nonprofit focused on creating sustainable centers of excellence in health in Africa. She served as vice-president, chief financial officer, and treasurer of Small Enterprise Assistance Funds, a nonprofit private equity fund manager that invests in small- and medium-sized companies in developing countries. She has also held positions at leading private sector institutions, including GE Capital and KPMG Peat Marwick.

Carol holds a bachelor's degree from the Catholic University of America and a master's degree in international development from the George Washington University Elliott School of International Affairs.


Veterinarian / Comedian Dr. Kevin Fitzgerald

The Colorado State University Board of Governors confirmed Amy Parsons as the 16th president of CSU effective Feb. 1, 2023, following a highly competitive, nationwide search process.

Amy served in various senior executive leadership roles at CSU and the CSU System and combines her higher education experience with a private sector background. Prior to her present role as CEO of Mozzafiato, LLC, Parsons was executive vice chancellor of the CSU System from 2015-2020; vice president for university operations at CSU from 2009-2015; deputy general counsel and associate legal counsel at CSU Fort Collins from 2004-2009. While working on campus, she taught courses for eight years in the Student Affairs in

Higher Education master's degree program. She worked as a litigation attorney for Denver-firm Brownstein, Hyatt, & Farber (now Brownstein, Hyatt, Farber, Schreck) from 1999-2004.

Parsons holds a bachelor's degree in political science from CSU and a Juris Doctorate from the University of Colorado. "I am humbled and honored to accept the responsibility of becoming the 16th president of Colorado State University. Bill Magnusson and Jude Kofie

Bill Magnusson is the epitome of all that Rotary represents.



In an act of kindness that will have an impact for years to come, Bill Magnusson, a piano tuner from Colorado, has given a talented young pianist a grand piano, lessons and the offer to tune the piano once a month for the rest of Magnusson's life.

The act didn't come out of the blue. Magnusson saw a news story about

an 11-year-old boy, Jude Kofie, who learned to play an old keyboard in his father's basement. His father, Isaiah Kofie, gave Jude a larger keyboard to help him develop his skills. Jude Kofie has an immense gift for playing what he hears, and has become the lead keyboardist in his local church, but had never had a formal lesson.

Magnusson, who describes the young pianist's talent as "Mozart-level", learnt Kofie's parents immigrated from Ghana and were raising four children, as well as sending over money to support their family in their home country.

"What resources are left over to help this special little soul?" Magnusson asked. Using his father's inheritance and his knowledge of pianos for sale in the area, Magnusson bought a \$15,000 grand piano, spent 17 hours tuning it, and promised to tune it once a month for the rest of his life. He also introduced Kofie to a local piano teacher and pays for ongoing piano lessons.

Through these thoughtful gifts, Magnusson has become part of the Kofie family. "Somebody to just love your son like that by making sure that his future is secured, we are super thankful," Kofie's father said. "The ripple effects for the next 70 or 80 years are incalculable," Magnusson said on his reason for the gifts. "It's not just for [Jude]. It's for all the people he's going to touch."

Returned Peace Corps Volunteers (RPCVs of Colorado)

RPCVs President Samantha Temple



Samantha is a fourth-year PhD candidate in the School of Public Affairs. As a researcher, she studies NGO partnerships, power dynamics, and USAID policy. Samantha is also a fundraiser with seven years of experience in international nonprofit development. As the cofounder and Director of a Denver-based international organization, Samantha works with a network of local NGOs in East Africa to improve and promote the development of the third sector. In this role she mentors a Tanzanian NGO network on strategic partnerships, professional development, and sector independence.

Samantha also works to educate funders, donors, and development professionals on the importance of local partnerships and local ownership. Samantha believes strongly in shifting development frameworks and tipping the scale toward locally-led development. She teaches courses in nonprofit management and international development. Prior to joining the SPA PhD cohort, Samantha received her Master's in Public Administration from the University of Colorado Denver and her BA in International Relations from Knox College.

Past RPCVs President Charlie Hunt



Charlie served as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Vanuatu from 2006 – 2008 as a business enterprise volunteer. He has been active in RPCVs of Colorado with the Welcome Wagon Committee for the past six years. He has also served as the Denver LoDo Rotary club president, international service chair and club foundation president. Charlie's club started a satellite group whose members all served as Peace Corps Volunteers, which doubled the size of the club and brought new energy. He has worked with other RPCV Rotarians to promote the signing of the partnership agreement between Peace Corps and Rotary International. Charlie retired from the Downtown Denver Partnership in 2018 where he worked in operations for the Downtown Denver Business Improvement District and the 14th St. General Improvement. Charlie served as the subject matter expert for growing trees in a downtown, and he was dubbed the "wizard of watts" for meeting the electrical needs of the 16th St. Mall vendors.

Xmas Miracle Shop - Principal Janace Fischer



Janace Fischer has worked in Jefferson County
Schools for 23 years; She has served as a school
social worker, assistant principal and principal. During
her childhood she lived in 10 different states and
moved almost every year that she was in school. She
graduated from Rocky Mountain High School in
Ft.Collins, received her Bachelors degree from
University of Colorado at Denver, her Masters degree
from New York University and her Principal
certification from the University of Denver.

Janace is passionate about serving marginalized populations and has spent her career doing this work in a variety of contexts. She is married to Andrew and they have a 17 year old daughter named Sienna and thirteen year old twins named Jason and Brianne. They also have a very spoiled 4 year old Mastador, named Luna.

Janace is excited about Partnering with the Rotary Club of Wheat Ridge in The Miracle Shop. The Miracle Shop had its inaugural opening two years ago and has supported over 200 families with purchasing gifts for their children during the holidays.



Global Access 2030 with Rob Miller and Roger Cabbage



Over the past twenty years as an industrial designer, Rob has applied his human centered design approach to engineer new products and develop patents for both international companies and regional start-ups. After co-inventing a low-cost water filter and seeing the impact of social design first-hand, he was asked to take the position of CEO at Global Access, 2030 (www.ga2030.org).

Roger, the founder of Global Access, met with Rob to share his mission to reduce the number of children that die every day from unsafe water in developing nations. They determined that the water filter adapter would be completed in several hours as a pro bono contribution to this cause. Now several years later, Rob is leading the development of new clean and safe water solutions in remote communities in over ten countries

Rob and Roger developed water filtration systems based on research in remote communities in the Peruvian Amazon. Rob learned that simplicity was the key to adopting new routines.

The system has minimal parts; cleaning needs no disassembly, tools, or backwashing. Rob's goal is to slowly remove charities from the clean water equation by uplifting entrepreneurs who wish to support community health. Toward that, Rob is making programs in Uganda, Rwanda, and Peru more self-reliant while growing infrastructure and data collection in expanding locations.



District Polio Plus Chair Marny Eulberg, MD



Marny is a polio survivor and a family physician, who has run a post-polio clinic in the Denver metro area since 1985. She is active in polio-related organizations in Colorado and nationally. She initiated the Colorado Post-Polio Wellness Camp in 2014 and, in 2015, a mobile "post-polio clinic" that travels throughout Colorado.

Marny's speaker topics include:

- What the polio virus does to the body; how it is transmitted (pathophysiology/pathology)
- The history of polio
- Personal and professional experiences with polio
- What is Post-Polio Syndrome?
- Current statistics about the polio eradication effort: cases/dollars/etc.
- Benefits of the polio eradication effort despite not yet being "At Zero"

Crutches 4 Africa - Dave Talbot



David contracted polio at age 2 ½ years, just 2 weeks after the announcement that the Salk vaccination had been developed. He went through several years of rehab. David put his focus on overcoming his physical challenges and even ran with the bulls in Pamplona, Spain.

He felt he had whipped polio, but after working in several careers, he now is back in the struggle against polio (post polio syndrome with its muscle and bone pain and increasing loss of strength in his polio-affected leg). After 45 years of freedom from mobility equipment, he now uses crutches and a leg brace. In the fall of 2016, he experienced a life threatening heart attack but has made an excellent recovery.

In 2005, when David was in Uganda with his wife, Candice, they witnessed a incredible need for mobility devices. This was the seed that grew into Crutches 4 Africa, which has delivered over 100,000 free mobility devices to people in need in 16 countries in Africa and 10 other countries in the developing world.

David is a Paul Harris Fellow, and was the 2011 recipient of the International Service Award for a Polio Free World.

Tamie Fennell for Pediatric Mental Health



Tamara (Tamie) Fennell has been working as a mental health advocate for two plus decades in Virginia and in Colorado.

As a past NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) Fairfax, Virginia Affiliate Board Member, a NAMI Virginia State Program Trainer and NAMI Colorado Douglas / Arapahoe County Program Facilitator, Tamie has led educational programs to help caregivers and family members understand and support those living with serious mental illness. Tamie has also given presentations and in-service initiatives raising awareness of mental health issues in educational settings.

Her work with law enforcement on crisis intervention training programs has been especially fulfilling, as has speaking before state legislators to enact change. Since moving to Colorado in 2015, Tamie has worked in non-profit operations, nonprofit fundraising and event coordination. Tamie lives in Roxborough Park with husband Kurt, is serving District 5450 as Area 4 Assistant Governor and is a Past President and current member of the Rotary Club of Highlands Ranch.

Our House is on Fire! How do you react when you hear that cry?

- Where's the exit?
- How do I get out?
- Can I help others?
- Can I help extinguish it?

Whatever your thoughts, it is an emergency and requires urgency!

Fellow Rotarians, our house is on fire and that fire is consuming our children. Our young people are experiencing a mental health crisis which has been worsened by the isolation, stress and anxiety created by the covid-19 pandemic. Today, suicide is a LEADING cause of death for youth in Colorado starting at age 10. This number is nearly double the national average.

Through the Rotary Endowed Fellowship for Pediatric Mental Health, Rotarians assist Children's Hospital recruit and train pediatric psychiatry providers to increase the number of kids in crisis receiving treatment. Once fully funded at \$500,000 the endowment's income will be used to support a Rotary Fellow who is working to pursue a career as a pediatric mental health provider (psychologist, psychiatrist, advanced practice provider or masters level clinician).
