

# Celebrating Rotary Days in London



To celebrate 100 years of service, the Rotary Club of London held several events to “Light Up Rotary” over the Rotary Days of March 20th and 21st, 2015. Club history, youth, service and leadership were themes throughout the weekend.

Thurs. March 19th, 2015

R.I. President Gary C.K. Huang and his wife Corinna arrived Thursday evening on the same date in 1915 when the first group of businessmen met to form the Rotary Club of London!

Friday, March 20th, 2015

Celebration of Service Clubs

12noon-R.I. President Gary spoke to the Canadian Club at their regular March meeting. The subject of the talk was about the importance of volunteers and the service they provide in their communities and in the world. Rotarians were there in good numbers, along with members of Lions, Kiwanis and Civitan.

Celebration of Community Service, Local and International

5-7p.m. Rotarians from District 6330 and their families gathered in the mezzanine at Covent Garden Market to celebrate service to the community and to dedicate the Tower Clock, the major anniversary project. It complements Rotary Square, which is a skating rink in the winter and an outdoor market and gathering place the rest of the year. The Square is maintained by the Rotary Clubs in London.

R.I. President Huang spoke to the assembled families of Rotary and other dignitaries, and congratulated them for their community service. The plaque for the clock was unveiled.

# Polio

## Experiencing National Immunization Days (NID)

National Immunization Days (NID) continue to be held multiple times each year in many Asian and African countries to vaccinate children from birth to 5 years of age against polio. Rotarian Pat Simone of the Rotary Club of London South, recently returned from a February NID in northern India and relishes the opportunity to share her experiences.

“Working as the Emergency Manager in a local Public Health Unit, I’m reminded of the blessings that we enjoy as Canadians; living in a country with access to many freedoms and established infrastructures ensuring our health, safety and well-being.

Through recent experiences with the healthcare system and government supported insurances, I’ve come to realize how we take for granted our ready access to clean water, sanitation and healthcare. While reminiscing about my previous experience as a Group Study Exchange participant to Taiwan 18 yrs. ago, I decided to participate in an NID this year. *Voluntourism* is a cultural exchange that is a chance to test your strength, to get a little scared doing something new and to see your efforts take shape in a very real way. Through Rotary International, I connected with PDG Nancy Barbee of District 7730, North Carolina and joined a team from Barbados, Canada and the States.

India’s population of 1.272 billion people has an estimated 800,000 households without access to latrines. The public health issues that fallout from these statistics are enormous: pollution, wide-spread disease, poverty, no clean water, crime, sexual assault and literacy issues. Although India’s polio eradication program has achieved the status of no longer being an endemic country, huge risks remain. Bordering Pakistan, Nepal and Bangladesh, the government is keenly aware that the current polio free status could change and, consequently, places great importance on annual mass vaccination campaigns where approximately 172 million children, in 20 million households are immunized. All regions maintain a state of readiness to undertake urgent campaigns for polio detection.

We travelled into Muslim and Hindu slums in cities and rural areas and met with medical officers and field monitors who ensured our safety and acted as translators. Children in these areas are often transient, nameless with their exact birthdates being unknown. Names are not recorded (only dose numbers), children’s left pinkie fingers are marked with an indelible pen and an age assessment is done by moving the child’s arm up and over the head to see if they can touch the opposite ear (maturation only allows this to occur beyond age 5)! Still an oral vaccine, India relies on the assistance of Rotarians around the world to promote and provide encouragement during their February vaccination campaign. The local World Health Organization office armed us with these statistics: 2,500,000 vaccinators disperse through 201 high risk districts in India using 225 million doses of live Oral Poliomyelitis Vaccine (OPV) which must be cold-chain maintained (kept refrigerated to a specific temperature to keep the virus alive). India’s government plans to withdraw OPV by 2018, in favour of the injected Inactivated Poliomyelitis Vaccine (IPV) that public health in Canada has long endorsed, thus further minimizing risks associated in the post eradication phase.

It seems so inadequate to say that our team felt honoured and privileged to experience India the way we did. We also had an opportunity to visit some major historic sites, like the Taj Mahal, as well as holy sites, palaces, forts and memorials. During the NID we were hosted by Rotarians in their homes and were graciously entertained and encouraged to embrace their culture, traditions and beliefs. This is a very life altering journey for any Rotarian to experience. I am so thankful for having been a part of it!”
