

Global Grant Approved

The first Global Grant sponsored by a club in our district has just been approved. PP Neville Gilbertson of the Rotary Club of Mount Gambier West developed a project to provide a GeneXpert machine to Klibur Domin, the Ryder-Cheshire home in Timor Leste.

The machine will test for Multi-drug resistant Tuberculosis (MDR-TB). Tests can be carried out in

about 2 hours instead of having to wait for sputum samples to be tested in Adelaide. This will reduce the chances of administering the wrong drugs.

The project will cost US \$36480 and has been supported by six clubs; Mount Gambier West, Casterton, Hamilton North, Millicent, Mount Gambier and Mount Gambier Lakes, as well as the D9780 District Designated Fund.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR 2016-2017 - Stephen Lamont (Gaye)

Stephen was born and raised in Geelong and attended The Geelong College before moving to Melbourne to study for his Bachelor of Pharmacy degree. He returned to Geelong to commence work at Grovedale Pharmacy which he later managed , then purchased in 1989. Stephen spent two years on the Young Members Committee of the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (Vic) whose role it was to advise the full board of the Society on matters pertaining to young pharmacists.

It was a request from a customer in late 1992 to attend a meeting of a new Rotary breakfast club that began his interest in Rotary and he joined the Rotary Club of Highton Kardinia in early 1993.

During his time in Rotary he has held nearly every position in the Club including President in 1998-99, Secretary 1994-96 and 2007-09 and Fundraising Chairman which resulted in providing funds with the Homeless Foundation to build a home for homeless youth in the Highton area. The home is still active

today and provides a secure environment to live in whilst they complete their secondary education.

Stephen has been recognised by his Club as a Paul Harris Fellow (Sapphire) and with an Avenues of Service Citation. At District level he has served as an Assistant Governor - Clubs , Conference Chairman and MC , Future Vision Co-ordinator , Chair of the Alumni Committee (Rotary Foundation) and an invited attendee at the Future Leaders seminar at the Zone Institute.



Outside of Rotary , Stephen is follower of the AFL and passionate supporter of the Geelong Football Club . He particularly enjoys catching up with family and friends for a day at the MCG. Other interests include motor sport — although he would prefer to be able to drive a formula one car rather than watch them! His interest in automobiles extends to his love of Jaguar cars and he has owned a number of Jaguars over the years. A workshop at home also allows him to do woodwork projects including furniture making.

He met his wife, Gaye, while at University where Gaye studied nursing. Gaye pursued her nursing career until their children began school and then joined Stephen working at the pharmacy.

Stephen and Gaye have two adult children who are currently studying at University. Recently they have moved to their "dream build" and live at Aireys Inlet on the Surfcoast. They enjoy the coastal lifestyle and are keen walkers of the bush tracks or beaches around their home. They both share a love of theatre, in particular musical theatre, an interest that extends to their two children.

Horsham Aerodrome aeromedical transfer station

Three Wimmera service groups are raising money to build an aeromedical transfer station at Horsham Aerodrome.

Ambulance Victoria Horsham Auxiliary, **Horsham East Rotary Club** and Freemasons Victoria Wimmera Lodge want to raise \$160,000 in the next six months for a purpose-built transfer station.

The structure would encompass two ambulance bays, with ample space.

Ambulance Victoria Horsham Auxiliary member and Horsham Ambulance Victoria team manager Paul Burton said it would be a safe, climate-controlled, well-lit environment for patients to be transferred from ambulances to aircraft, away from the challenges of weather and darkness. "The beds in the back of our ambulances and the beds on most aircraft are configured

differently," he said. Patients had to be manually transferred from one bed to another. Air ambulances landed at Horsham Aerodrome 425 times in the past 12 months. Patients and paramedics were exposed to the elements during the transfers. "We've

done it this way forever and just accepted it," Mr Burton said.

But he said the development was urgently needed. "It will give paramedics and specialist medical evacuation services people a point of patient care while waiting for helicopters and planes," he said. He said it was especially important when patients were in a fragile or deteriorating condition.

Nhill Ambulance Patient Transfer Station inspired moves for a similar facility in Horsham. A Victorian first, Nhill's patient transfer station opened in July last year. It was paid for by com-

munity donations, amounting to almost \$80,000.

Ambulance Victoria Nhill team leader Gemma McMahon said the idea arose due to the number of people transferred by air ambulance in the 2009-10 financial year. "When we first came up with the project, 36 patients had been transferred via air ambulance," she said. On average, Horsham Aerodrome sees more than one aeromedical attendance each day. Last year, there were 55 occasions when more than one patient was transported at one time. Mr Burton anticipated the frequency would increase.

Horsham East Rotary Club president Jenny Reid said she and Freemasons Victoria Wimmera

said she and Freemasons Victoria Wimmera
Lodge co-ordinator Philip Nicks were equally
convinced of the need for a Horsham aeromedical transfer station. "We think six months is an

achievable goal," Ms Reid said. She said people could support the initiative via a fundraising account at Westpac Bank, with the customer reference Horsham Auxiliary Donation. She said people could call her on 0418146846 for more information.

Mr Nicks encouraged

trades and services suppliers to consider in-kind support. "The sooner it can be built, the better," he said.
