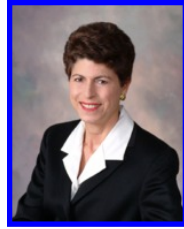

Montreal Musings (food for partnering thought)

More than 18,000 Rotarians from 154 countries and geographical areas left the 2010 RI Convention in Montréal after being challenged to finish the job of eradicating polio and reminded that their efforts are making a difference, even when the results aren't immediately apparent.

During four packed days of plenary and breakout sessions, we were privy to an impressive lineup of speakers:

Montreal's mayor, Gerald Tremblay, said this convention was the most important gathering in the city's history. He also noted how the city and Rotary share many of the same values. "Rotary is like a mini assembly of the United Nations, we are both international, and we both have a wide diversity of cultures."



Jo Luck, president of Heifer International and a member of the Rotary Club of Little Rock emphasized the power of pooling forces with other organizations to carry out more effective service projects.



Queen Noor of Jordan highlighted the importance of building sustainable communities through the work of The Rotary foundation and of collaborating with like-minded organizations.



Greg Mortenson thanked us for our efforts to eradicate polio in Afghanistan and Pakistan and stressed the importance of building relationships and involving local leaders.

Father Marciano "Rocky" Evangelista, founder of the Tuloy Foundation Inc. and a member of the Rotary Club of Alabang, Metro Manila works with street children and encouraged us to do so too.

Musings (continued)

Ontario's Lieutenant Governor, David C. Onley, a polio survivor and disability rights advocate urged us to work with disabled communities and help eliminate prejudices against people with disabilities.

Marios Antoniou from Cypress, a recent graduate of the Rotary Peace Center at Duke University and University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill explained the context of conflict and progress toward peace on the island. He stressed stressed that education and social justice are the building blocks of peace.



Bob Mazzuca, chief scout executive of the Boy Scouts of America noted the long relationship between the Boy Scouts and Rotary and noted the many similarities between The Four-Way Test and the Scout Law.

Polio survivor Ramesh Ferris, a member of the Rotary Club of Whitehorse, Yukon said that the real key is empowering people and when you empower people you can make a change in the world.



Dolly Parton entered the stage singing her hit song "9 to 5," and thanked Rotary for partnering with her foundation's Imagination Library to promote children's literacy and finished with a song she wrote for the Imagination Library called "Try."

Attendees were also dazzled by a variety of entertainment acts, including the Irish singing group Celtic Thunder, known for its combination of soloists and ensembles; the daring acrobatics of the Cirque du Soleil; and the soaring vocals of tenor Russell Watson.

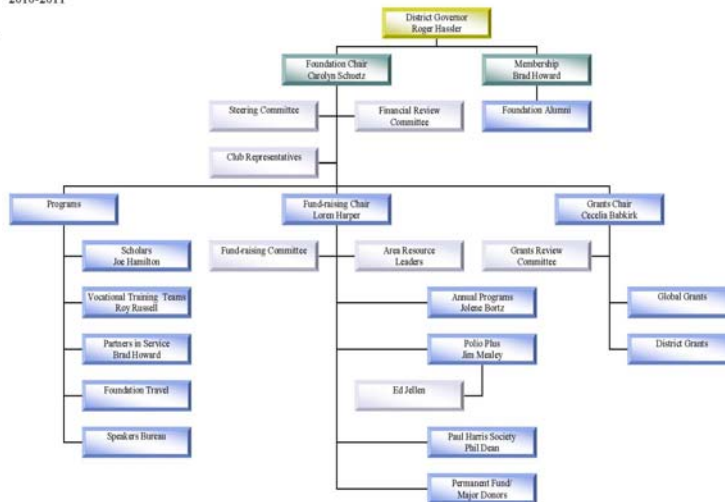

Polio Update

Bruce Aylward, director of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative at the World Health Organization, encouraged Rotarians to share the "terrific news" that polio is on the run, and that Rotary's vision of a polio-free world is within sight. "You have fundamentally changed the polio eradication game, and you have changed it in your favor. But it is critical to finish the job, something made clear by the recent outbreak in Tajikistan, noting that 300 children in the country have been paralyzed by the virus, adults have died, borders have been closed, and travel banned. He said the outbreak is a stark reminder of the consequences of global fatigue in this battle. The stakes are now much higher, because in the past 12 months you have proved, without a doubt, that polio can be eradicated. The world has also learned the full consequences of failure.



Emergency funds from PolioPlus -- a total of US\$500,000 -- were released within 48 hours of the Tajikistan outbreak, which is now showing signs of stopping. He also shared the encouraging news of the new bivalent vaccine, effective against both remaining types of the poliovirus, and noted the absence of new cases in Bihar and Uttar Pradesh, India, in the past six months. Rotarians have done the extraordinary in the pursuit of polio eradication," you have truly put Service Above Self, and you have truly put Rotary on the world's stage."

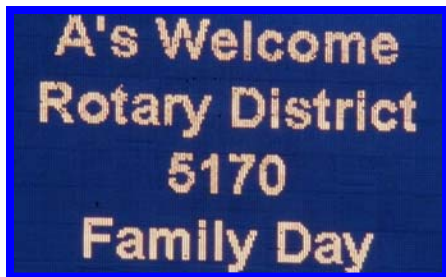
My congratulations to outgoing Governor Raymond, incoming Lt. Governor Sophia, and all the members of the Interact District Council, for a job well done.
