

2015 Outgoing GSE Team Leader Carl Michel met with his team December 13 at the house of Bill and Sharron Newton to prepare for their trip to Melbourne, Australia, and Rotary District 9800, on February 19, 2015. They will return on March 22.

Team members are Alex Michael (Account Executive for LeSEA Broadcasting Corp.), Matthew Winterkorn (Meteorologist, Stennis Space Center), Kait Sukiennik (Office Manager, Home Instead Senior Care), and Chris Vignes (Public Information Officer, City of Gulfport).

Through the Feeding the Needy Program sponsored by the Rotary Club of Covington, over 300 volunteers show up each Christmas morning at the St. Paul's School cafeteria to deliver more than 1,500 Christmas meals to students and families in the area who are in need. Last year 1,565 dinners were delivered. The program addresses the needs of local students who are reliant on the food supplied by free school meal programs, which is not available during the Christmas holidays.

In November the Rotary club hosted its annual Feeding the Needy fundraiser lunch at the Clarion Inn in Covington. This event is the main fundraiser for the Feeding the Needy program. Over 100 community members and supporters of the program attended the fundraiser luncheon, which featured a presentation titled "No Bad Days, No Bad Service" by motivational speaker Bruce Hamilton.

The Northlake-Mandeville Rotary Club is celebrating Christmas with a multi-faceted series of events over the holiday season. Entitled "Tis the Season of Joy and Giving", the plans include three projects:

The Rotary club, City of Mandeville, and other key sponsors are presenting a large, one-of-a-kind model train display in the windows of Aquarius Pools near the Old Mandeville Trail-head. The snow village and train display is reminiscent of the Christmas window scenes in downtown New Orleans at Maison Blanche and D. H. Holmes.



The second project involves raising funds to provide gifts for children enrolled in the Mande-ville-Lecombe Head Start program. The project assists 115 pre-school children from low-income families, many of whom cannot afford Christmas presents for their kids. The Rotary club has set up a tree at the Farmers Market at the Trailhead and is working a table to secure additional funds. Club members at the table will also be introducing Rotary to passersby, the third project. This Rotary Day will introduce the community to Mandeville Ro-

tary and its mission of service and fellowship. Members will talk about what it means to be a Rotarian, their personal experiences of the club, and what Rotary is doing to make a difference in the community.

Friendship Exchange - Vermont and Russia

Vermont - <u>Feb. 11 to 21, 2015</u>, 'a group of Rotarians from Vermont District 7850 will join us for some of the **Mardi Gras** festivities, and other features of our Gulf Coast Region! September 29 to October 7, 2015, or September 30 to October 10, 2015, D6840 Rotarians are invited to a special part of New England to enjoy Vermont's renowned **Fall Foliage**, and other activities! Mont-real is a terrific spot for coming and going! D7850 includes Sherbrook in Canada, and Burlington, VT, featuring the University of Vermont & Middlebury Colleges, in a charming and picturesque town. The Shelburne Museum is near Burlington – a fascinating destination that could

take a whole day. There are local and historical sites in the Upper Valley (near Dartmouth College), Montpelier (capital of VT), Waterbury area (home of Ben and Jerry's ice cream).

District Committee Reports - ShelterBox Response to the Philippines



Thanks to the overwhelming support of our donors, ShelterBox has been able to help more than 130,000 families around the world since our inception in 2000. In 2014, we have already sent aid to more than 25 different disasters and throughout the holidays we will be looking back at how these responses have made a difference to families in need as a direct result of the support of our donors.

2014 began with our response team volunteers working in revolving shifts to deliver assistance to families across the Philippines who had lost their homes and livelihoods as a result of Typhoon Haiyan. In the first few months of the year, we had already sent more than 100 volunteers to help in the region and our commitment to the people of the Philippines has continued throughout the year with the launch of our projects to deliver "Core Transitional" shelters – resilient temporary structures that allow people to move on from living in emergency shelter.



These shelters are designed to house a single family, constructed wherever possible using locally sourced materials and applying "build back safer" standards. They will not only provide more than 8,000 vulnerable people with a safe, durable home but will also contribute to generating work in the region and in helping to galvanize communities.

Toby Ash is the Philippines country coordinator for ShelterBox and has been working in the Philippines throughout the year to help deliver the implementation of our projects work. Ash said: "By April the basic needs of those affected had been largely met – most had access to some basic shelter to protect them from the elements. But traveling through the great swathe of the country that was affected, it was clear that the future of many of Haiyan's survivors remained precarious - the road to recovery would be long and difficult, and many would not be able to get there without further assistance. In many disasters, the provision of a tent and other household items are all that is required for those affected to start rebuilding their lives. But the scale of the damage has made the process of recovery much more difficult.

"The typhoon destroyed millions of coconut trees, rice fields and thousands of fishing boats, leaving those who depend on them for their living without any income. And with no income there can be no rebuilding. Even those able to eke out a living are faced with the stark choice of having to put food on the table and sending their children to school or buying building materials. Then, of course there are society's most vulnerable. How does a frail, elderly woman rebuild her home by herself?

"Over the course of the summer, we signed partnership agreements with four large international aid organizations – ACTED, Handicap International, Islamic Relief and Catholic Relief Services. In total, we will be building almost 1,700 transitional shelters built mainly of locally sourced materials in four separate locations badly affected by the typhoon. Although not permanent, they are designed and built to be resilient. Each will meet the "build back safer" guidelines as recommended by the International Federation of the Red Cross (IFRC) shelter technical team here.

"But in many ways these projects are bigger than the individual shelters themselves. We are working with our partners to create shelters that can serve as examples of safe building practice in the communities. Moreover, we are directly training carpenters and engaging the wide community in safer building practices, with the goal of leaving them better prepared for natural disasters in the future."




