


# Leave a Legacy District 6840 Newsletter May, 2015

for shipping to the next recipient country. District 6840 will be notified when and where the shoes ultimately go. There was a shipment of other shoes ready to be loaded for the trip to Nicaragua at the back loading bay.

The Rotary Club of Hammond's annual Shamrock Run 5K/10K was held on March 14. The 706 participants were the most to register in the five-year history of the event, which raised over \$20,000 in net income.



The Shamrock Run is the Club's major fund-raiser in support of its grant program for non-profit organiza-

Tara Drive is a facility for twenty mentally challenged adults who live and work together under supervised care in Harrison County. In May of 2014, the presidents and incoming presidents of the Beach Territory decided to meet about every six weeks throughout the Rotary year, with ADG Vicky Gutierrez, to discuss relevant Rotary topics.

Meetings were used to discuss ways that clubs could meet criteria for the Presidential Citation and Visionary Leader Award, inform others on individual club events and activities, discuss District topics and events, as well as ways to improve meeting attendance and giving to the Foundation.

Clubs began the year by jointly staffing a table at Edgewater Mall, during Edgewater's annual children's health fair, to educate others about Rotary and Polio Plus. In September a territory social was held for members and potential members at the Biloxi Yacht Club. This social was also used as a time that individual members could meet and talk to the District Governor as well as upcoming Governors. In October, members of the Beach Territory sponsored a dinner/social for the



members of District 6840 to honor the teens visiting from Ireland and Friends Forever.

Class size is limited to 65 students, and is filled on a first come, first served basis. Also on the website are form letters to send to high school counselors, and documents outlining club responsibilities.

**Sohag Hospital (Egypt) Neo Natal Care Global Grant -** I would like to propose to you a new Global Grant project in the Healthcare Area of Focus with a Vocational Training Team (VTT) component in the project. The project entails supplying 6 neonatal incubators for Sohag Hospital which is 150 KM south of Cairo, in Sohag state, serving six million people in 4 states (Sohag / Qena/ New Vally and Hurgada). The Hospital has old incubators and many babies die be-

cause of the unavailability of workable incubators. Sohag is the poorest state in Egypt and parents of new born babies have no means to save their babies outside of the Sohag hospital.

The project sustainability will be realized by the existing need of incubators by the hospital, training of staff (physicians and nurses) by Rotarian doctors and warrantee of the equipment supplier who has a major market share, and capacity building through a VTT. 3 physicians will be carefully chosen to travel for training in Germany for one month to receive training on this field of specialty and will stay at Rotarians homes or at the hospital lodging.

Total project budget is \$63,500 - as shown below. 4 Rotary clubs in Germany and their districts already pledged \$21,000 - with TRF matching, this will give total of \$37,000. It is well appreciated to receive your pledge for contribution to the project which is needed to save the lives of premature new born babies and build the experience for young physicians.

Neonatal incubators (6): \$45,000 - including warrantee and on site training

VTT (3 physicians): \$10,000 - including travel and living expenses

Contingencies: \$5,000

Measurements: \$2,000 - to measure the project results

Transportation to site: \$ 1,000

Rotary Banners: \$500

Total \$63,500


#### Leadership Development Series

# District Committee Reports - Volunteer Service Award & ShelterBox Ambassador Field Experience



**SARASOTA**, **Fla.**, **April 15**, **2015** – As National Volunteer Week, April 12-18, is being observed, **Ken Thompson**, a member of the **Rotary Club of Slidell** of Rotary District **6840**, has been recognized by President Obama and humanitarian organization, ShelterBox USA with the President's Volunteer Service Award for **his** efforts in 2014 to assist disaster survivors.

When disasters like Cyclone Pam in the Vanuatu and the Syrian refugee crisis strike, many want to help. **Ken** took action for <u>ShelterBox</u>, an international disaster relief organization that delivers <u>emergency</u> tented shelter and other lifesaving supplies to survivors of disasters & other humanitarian crises.

Through **Ken**'s efforts of raising awareness and funds for ShelterBox, the organization was able to respond to more than 23 disasters last year, providing families with disaster relief tents, cook stoves, water filters, blankets, mosquito nets, children's packs and other essential equipment. In one of the more busy years in ShelterBox history, ShelterBox has sent aid to support more than 10,500 families.

"I am incredibly honored to work alongside our volunteers, including **Ken**," said Alan Monroe, Interim Executive Director of ShelterBox USA. "It is through their continuous efforts that we are able to bring shelter, warmth and dignity to so many families displaced by disaster around the globe."

The President's Volunteer Service Award is a special recognition presented on behalf of President Barack Obama. The award is part of a national recognition program created in 2003 through the President's Council on Service and Civic Participation for individuals of all ages who contribute a significant amount of time to volunteer activities.

One of the responsibilities of a ShelterBox Ambassador is to train other Ambassadors, through such events as the annual ShelterBox Ambassador Field Experience, held this year April 24-26 in Mason

County, Texas, at a hunting lodge owned and operated by ShelterBox Response Team and Board member Tim Osburn, and his wife, DGE Melinda Osburn. In order to simulate a deployment in response to a real disaster, the hunting lodge is transformed for three days into a mythical South American country called Fredonia. The little country has been racked by revolution and flooding. A new nation called West Fredonia has separated from the rest of Fredonia, and entire villages have been destroyed by the constant fighting and high water.





The twelve new Ambassadors have been divided into three ShelterBox Response Teams. Each team must decide which of two displaced villages will receive their limited aid consignment. Each village chief will make a plea that his village is more desperately in need of assistance. The village chiefs - Ken Thompson and Louis Turpin - are members of the ShelterBox Ambassador Council, an advisory group assisting the ShelterBox USA staff and Board of Directors.

While Fredonia may be fictitious, the situations presented are not; they are all based on true field experiences. The teams learn patience, perseverance, communication, and cooperation; all key elements in the field.

We welcome aboard Erin Granberry, Rotary Club of Hattiesburg, and Mark Dispenza, Rotary Club of Hammond, as Rotary Club Liaisons for ShelterBox.

From the District Youth Exchange Officer - I think we can all agree that our fabulous Rotary Youth Exchange Students added a great deal to an already outstanding District Conference. They helped unload cars and trucks prior to the Food Fest, they chased

down signs when the winds picked up, and a number of clubs put them work serving crawfish, ice cream, and everything but alcohol! They didn't have much time on stage, but when they did take

over the microphones, they made us all cry with their stories of growth and gratitude. As a team, our 4 Inbound students from both districts and our 3 Outbound students (to India, Denmark, and Ecuador) rolled up their sleeves and did great Service Above Self at the Stop Hunger Now! service project.

I think everyone who met them fell in love with the pure joy they radiated (see pictures here and on the District and RC of Covington fb pages). We are truly building international goodwill and friendship by having the students among us. It is clear that we need to continue to expand this program.

Special thanks to the RC of Biloxi for home-hosting and providing transportation to and from Beau Rivage every day.

If those of you involved in the return of Rotary Youth Exchange have not heard me say it, THANK YOU!!! Without the dedication and goodwill of the host families and host clubs and host RYE Committees, these wonderful teenagers would not be here.

The District RYE Committee needs to expand our membership. Two years ago, we had no students at all. Last year, we hosted 2 (Belgium, Ecuador) and selected 1 (currently in Taiwan). This year, we are hosting 3 (Brazil, Taiwan, Denmark) and selected 3 (Ecuador, Denmark, India). Next year we hope to host 4 (India, Denmark, Ecuador, Hungary) and send at least that many (countries to be determined). We need more Rotarians engaged at the District level to sustain this growth.

If you were moved at all by our students this weekend, you have the only qualification you need to serve on the District Committee! We are creating experts as we go. Please contact me at <a href="mailto:rye6840@gmail.com">rye6840@gmail.com</a> and we will find a way for you to be involved.
