'I am deeply sorry for my actions': Ndabeni-Abrahams breaks silence By Sthembile Cele

South Africans have expressed mixed reactions to communications and digital technologies minister Stella Ndabeni-Abrahams' apology for breaking lockdown regulations.

On Wednesday, Ndabeni-Abrahams was put on special leave for two months, one of them without pay, after a picture of her surfaced on social media visiting former deputy higher education minister Mduduzi Manana during the lockdown. The now-deleted picture showed Ndabeni-Abrahams, who Manana described as a friend, seated at the table having a meal on Sunday.

"It was great to host a former colleague and dear sister Cde Stella Ndabeni-Abrahams on her way back from executing critical and essential services," the caption read.

Soon after the picture went viral, Ndabeni-Abrahams was slammed for her actions and was taken to task by President Cyril Ramaphosa.

Ramaphosa expressed his disapproval of the minister's actions, saying she had undermined the requirement that all citizens stay at home during the lockdown.

"None of us — not least a member of the National Executive — should undermine our national effort to save lives in this very serious situation. I am satisfied that Minister Ndabeni-Abrahams appreciates the seriousness of what she has done and that no-one is above the law."

In her apology, Ndabeni-Abrahams asked South Africans to find it in their hearts to forgive.

In the video recording, she also admitted that having lunch with a group of people at the invitation of Manana was breaking the lockdown regulations.

"I regret the incident and am deeply sorry for my actions. I hope that the president and you South Africans will find it in your hearts to forgive me.

"The president has put me on special leave. I undertake to abide by the conditions of the leave," she said.

However, despite the apology by the minister, many, online, said they wanted more action to be taken against her for violating the lockdown regulations.

Covid-19 lockdown: 42-year-old arrested selling drugs, six pack of Hunters for R200

Cape Town - A join operation between the South African Police Services (SAPS) and City of Cape Town law enforcement officers lead to the arrest of a 42-year-old suspect on Wednesday for selling booze and drugs during lockdown.

On April 8, in a joint operation, SAPS and City of Cape Town's Law Enforcement Advancement Program (LEAP) officers, acting on information received went to an address in Buh-Rein Estate, Kraaifontein.

"It was suspected the occupants were dealing in alcohol during the lockdown period," said Wayne Dyason, Law Enforcement inspector.

"Upon arrival at the address the officers found a stash of alcohol, cigarettes and drugs which included cocaine and mandrax. The bottles of alcohol had labels stuck on them indicating inflated prices for each item. These items and a cash amount of R5 250 was confiscated."

SAPS arrested the suspect for dealing in drugs and alcohol and possession of drugs.

Community Safety MEC Albert Fritz has also urged all "members of the public who are aware of the illegal sale of alcohol to immediately report such".

Essential baby items, clothing can be sold in lockdown: Dlamini-Zuma

Essential baby items and clothing may now be sold in stores during the 21-day lockdown, the department of co-operative governance and traditional affairs (Cogta) said on Thursday.

"Following requests for clarification, we confirm that this provision includes baby clothes, blankets, towels and other essential accessories for newborns, infants and toddlers up to 36 months old," said minister Nkosazana Dlamini-Zuma

"To ensure the effectiveness of the lockdown in containing the spread of Covid-19, all stores that are currently permitted to remain open for the sale of other essential goods, including supermarkets, may therefore sell these products."

"Hospitals and clinics may directly procure these products as necessary to provide for the infants in their care," she added.

'Lockdown ends April 16 ... but I didn't mention which year,' jokes Ramaphosa

Ramaphosa, laughing, replies: "I didn't mention which year".

Clapping and cheers echo through city as Capetonians thank SA's essential staff

At 20:00 sharp, almost like clockwork, appreciative cheers and clapping can be heard across many a neighbourhood in South Africa, as South Africans give their thanks to those working on the frontlines during the lockdown.

News24 was there when residents of Sea Point, Cape Town cheered on medical, law enforcement and other essential services staff, who tirelessly provide much-needed help in times of uncertainty.

"It's an amazing show of solidarity of all the residents to all of our frontline workers, the doctors, the nurses, the pharmacy staff, our people in food, all of the shops that we go to for our groceries and that," resident Brenton Loubser told News24 while standing in his front garden.

The cheering continued for a couple of minutes before residents headed back inside their flats.

"For a few minutes you tend to forget about the seriousness of everything and it's almost an amazing show of human solidarity and real support for those people that are fighting for us on the front line," Loubser added.

In a recording of a video conference the president held at Rand Water on Tuesday, Ramaphosa gave life to the meme when he said: "Some people are saying the 16th of April (the lockdown will end) but when we announced it I didn't say what year it would end."

The entire teleconference broke out in laughter.

Presidency insiders said the president was definitely making reference to the meme which he had also seen.

On a serious note, Ramaphosa later told journalists that the government was yet to decide whether the 21-day lockdown would end next Thursday.

The president was making the point that he wants water distribution to be ramped up even beyond the end of the lockdown.

"And I don't know when the lockdown will end," the president said.

Health experts denounce growing Covid-19 stigma

In the battle to defeat Covid-19, a young Khayelitsha mother and her family have an unwelcome secondary fight on their hands — against the stigma growing around people infected with the virus.

After the 25-year-old tested positive eight days ago, becoming the first coronavirus victim in Cape Town's largest township, her landlady asked her to leave. Then a flood of hateful social media posts and voice notes began circulating.

The mother of one had been treated like "someone with leprosy", said a family spokesperson. "After she informed the landlady about the outcome of her test, a department of health vehicle came to pick them up on Sunday. Neighbours stood outside watching. It was a spectacle. The landlady showed uneasiness.

She wanted her out of her premises."

Rumours that the young mother had been paid "to spread the virus" proliferated after she and her child were taken into isolation.

"It is worse than the stigma that was attached to HIV/Aids," said the family spokesperson. "I am praying for her safety as there is so much anger out there."

Infectious disease experts called for calm and compassion this week, arguing that stigmatising Covid-19 could fuel the spread of the virus because victims would do their best to conceal their condition.

Linda-Gail Bekker, head of the Desmond Tutu HIV Centre at the University of Cape Town, warned that excluding people based on their illness could harm treatment programmes, as it did with HIV/Aids.

"Stigma drives people underground, affects their mental wellbeing and makes our efforts to reach, test and treat everyone so much harder," said Bekker. "This is an airborne disease like colds and flu. We don't blame people who have these diseases, we normally feel sorry for them."

Treatment Action Campaign chair Sibongile Tshabalala said there was an impression that Covid-19 only affects people who have travelled outside the country. "I see the ignorance every day in the township," she said.

She added: "One of the biggest reasons people stop or refuse to take antiretroviral treatment is stigma. Sadly, Covid-19 will most likely affect more people who have TB and HIV, including those who are not on treatment or do not know their status.

Leigh-Ann Snyman, patient-support manager with Doctors Without Borders, called for compassion instead of shaming for those infected with Covid-19.

Stigma is often found where fear exists. Stigma also thrives where misinformation runs unchecked." "It is crucial that the blaming of patients who bear no fault at all be clearly and strongly denounced, and that a culture of compassion is encouraged instead."

Newspaper headlines: PM's intensive care move dominates front pages

The main story across all of the papers is Boris Johnson's move to intensive care late on Monday evening.

In the words of the Daily Mail, the drastic step was taken because the stricken prime minister was struggling to breathe. According to the Daily Mirror, there are concerns that he could have pneumonia.

The Times says the deterioration in Mr Johnson's condition was rapid. It quotes sources at St Thomas's Hospital near Westminster who say he needed four litres of oxygen - below the normal threshold in intensive care of 15 litres. The prime minister, it adds, has not been intubated, where a tube is inserted into the windpipe before ventilation.

The Daily Telegraph says Carrie Symonds, Mr Johnson's partner, who is pregnant, is thought to have been unable to visit him since he was admitted to hospital. The Times says she is thought to be staying in Camberwell, south London with their dog, Dilyn.

After 76-day lockdown, people leave Wuhan as airport reopens

The Wuhan Tianhe International Airport resumed domestic passenger flights early in the morning on Wednesday after the 11-week lockdown in central China's Wuhan was lifted.

The reopening of the airport marks an important milestone as life returns to normal in the city, which bore the brunt of the novel coronavirus disease (Covid-19) epidemic in China.

The first flight since the city's lockdown was lifted departed from Wuhan at 7.25am on Wednesday, bound for Sanya in south China's Hainan province, with most of the 48 passengers on board travelling for work-related reasons.

More than 10,000 travellers have left Wuhan by plane. China is still maintaining strict screening protocols even though the lockdown has been lifted.

Cuomo warns New Yorkers to not relax their social distancing measures, even after some encouraging coronavirus numbers: "We can't handle the worst-case scenarios. We can't even handle the moderate-case scenarios."

However, the governor warned that the state's progress could be undone if social distancing practices are relaxed too quickly.

"Remember, the 1918 Spanish flu came in three waves," Cuomo said. "We're on the first wave. Everybody is assuming, well, once we get through this, we're done. I wouldn't be so quick to assume that. This virus has been ahead of us from day one."

New York recorded 799 deaths from coronavirus yesterday, bringing the state's total death toll to 7,067. Cuomo said the state would be bringing in additional funeral directors to help deal with the surge of deaths.

As the state mourns the loss of several thousand New Yorkers, there are also signs that social distancing is flattening the curve.

FRANCE

France reported some positive coronavirus-linked data on Wednesday, with the increase of hospital death fatalities slowing again, but the presidential palace said nonetheless the national lockdown aimed at containing the disease would be extended.

The lockdown, that took effect on March 17 and has already been extended once, will now go beyond April 15, a move that was widely expected.

French President Emmanuel Macron will address the nation regarding the new coronavirus situation on Monday evening, the presidential palace added.

Earlier in the day, Prime Minister Edouard Philippe said the lockdown had helped contain the spread of the coronavirus but stressed the time to lift the restrictions had not yet come.

The number of people who died from coronavirus infections in French hospitals climbed by 8% in a day – versus 9% on Tuesday and 10% on Monday – to a cumulative total of 7,632, state health agency director Jerome Salomon told a news conference.

But he added the day's figures were incomplete because, due to technical issues, authorities were not able to register nursing homes data, which account for more than 30% of total fatalities.

The total death toll, including Tuesday's nursing homes' figures, is up 5% at 10,869.

Salomon also pointed out that the rate of new admissions in ICU units, almost flat at 0.2%, decelerated for a ninth consecutive day.

"It's an important indicator. But the pressure on hospitals remains extremely high," he said.

SPAIN

"We have reached the peak" of the pandemic, says Spain's PM

Spain will soon start the process of de-escalation of the current lockdown measures in place to mitigate the novel coronavirus pandemic in the country, Spanish Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez said today, as he asked Parliament to approve his request to extend the country's state of emergency until April 26.

"We have reached the peak and now the de-escalation begins," Sanchez told a nearly empty Spanish Parliament Thursday, as most lawmakers are working from home.

He cautioned however, that return to normal life would be "gradual", in line with the severity of the current health crisis. "The climb has been difficult, as the descent will also be."

"We are facing the biggest threat to the planet's public health since the flu of 1918," Sanchez said, explaining that the resumption of normal activity would only happen in phases. "The last thing we should allow is a step backwards because that would be more than a setback" but "it would be a rebound", for the virus.

The head of the Spanish government went on to say that "Europe cannot afford to look the other way," when it comes to the novel coronavirus and called on MPs to unite and advocate for a united European response to the crisis. "The European Union is in danger if there is no solidarity against the virus."

The Spanish Prime Minister told opposition MPs that his government is "working on a plan" to slowly bring the country back into some form or "normality" but warned: "We can't even know what kind of normality we're returning to."

Spain has been the world's second most heavily affected country by the coronavirus pandemic so far, after the US. Almost 150,000 confirmed cases of the virus have been detected and the death toll currently stands at 14,792.
